

Be prepared to be swept off your feet in this programme of music by Saint-Saëns and Mendelssohn featuring one of the world's great cellists Steven Isserlis and leader of the superb Iuventus Chamber Orchestra, Ruth Rogers, who we are thrilled to welcome back. Saint-Saëns' Second Cello Concerto is utterly captivating: in just two movements, a deeply lyrical, virtuosic and passionate work to lose yourself in - and especially so in the hands of the wonderful Steven Isserlis. By contrast Saint-Saëns' Introduction and Rondo Capriccioso is one of the great showpieces of the virtuoso violinist's repertory - dazzling, charming, irresistible! Bookending the soloists is Mendelssohn. His lovely overture 'The Fair Melusine' opens the evening, and what more truly uplifting work to close and send you out into the night with music in your heart: Mendelssohn's 'Italian' Symphony. It is, he said, the 'happiest piece I have ever written'. What more can we say?

The sound of a brass band is unique: that warm astringency of brass in song evoking, somehow, the spirit of a community coming together. This Belgian-born jazz vocalist and composer is renowned for her pure, powerful and supremely elegant voice. Her Parisian jazz and tango arrangements present a fresh, contemporary take on iconic songs by the likes of Piaf, Piazzolla, Legrand and Brel and she has performed at many leading London venues and across the UK on tour to great acclaim. Her latest album, Across the Bridge, features 12 original songs in English and her native French, drawing on her love of jazz, chansons, tango, latin rhythm and new-age, and themes of nature, art, social justice and ideology. Now based in France, this is an unmissable opportunity to catch live this very special artist, with her band including guitar virtuoso Nicolas Meier.



And, of course, there is a double celebration to be had, with the Coronation imminent! With Handel's rousing Zadok the Priest, the Hallelujah chorus from his Messiah and some resplendent organ music by Elgar to complete the evening, this superb patriotic programme, in one of England's most beautiful historic spaces, promises to linger long in the memory.

He has worked with some of the leading instrumentalists of our time and is a Gramophone Award-winning soloist in his own right, appearing with orchestras including the LSO, RPO and LPO. As a composer and orchestrator, too, he has worked with such recording artists as Tasmin Little, Leonidas Kavakos, Yuja Wang, Nigel Kennedy, Joseph Calleja and Nicola Benedetti. For the Festival, John Lenehan showcases the Abbey's new Yamaha grand piano (gifted by the Festival) in a mouth-watering recital programme that will put it through its paces. Look forward to music by Bach, Schubert and Chopin, Ukrainian composers Valentin Silvestrov and Nikolai Kapustin, and jazz giants Fats Waller, Duke Ellington and Bill Evans!
